

WHO IS INVOLVED IN THE AWARD?



SUMMARY OF THE AWARD

There are four levels of award: Pin, Bronze, Silver and Gold.

The awards 'home base' is either in a parish or a school.

Participants accrue credits of service in their parish and / or school and the wider community.

The Faith in Action Award builds on what young people already experience in serving others, asking them to reflect upon it so that they may find new ways of living out and exploring their faith.

There is an opportunity for both guided reflections, through group reflection points (4 reflections) and personal reflection, through journaling.

At the end of the scheme, participants submit a final piece of work for affirmation before being awarded their Faith in Action Award.

MANDATORY REQUIREMENTS FROM CYMFED FOR THIS AWARD

The Faith in Action Award is designed to be flexible. However, to ensure the integrity and consistency of the Award, there are a few mandatory requirements to follow:

Participating Organisations must be registered with an Awarding Authority

4 reflection points in a minimum of two meetings and must cover a minimum of six hours

Each reflection point must cover God's story, Church story and Personal story

Gaining credits for service in two places ("home and away") after Pin level

Young people must submit a final piece of work for moderation

Young people must journal through the award showing service and reflection on that service and submit the journal with their final piece of work (Come back to)

A celebration must take place at the end of the award year to celebrate the achievements of the young people who have completed the Award

PIN AWARD – USED TO BE SEEKING NEW DISCOVERY

Pin Level is for young people of Year 6 age (10/11), or older. It is designed to allow young people to discover how faith shapes lives, thus acting as a stepping stone to the higher award levels. The requirements of Pin Level should fit alongside existing structures within your parish or school and should be undertaken as a class or group.

Having taken early steps in establishing a personal relationship with God, participants begin to see that this relationship has an outward and visible effect upon them and those around them. As they seek to know God better, they become aware that others, of all ages, are trying to do the same. This draws us together in community. Seeking to serve the community helps us discover even more about ourselves, each other and God.

BRONZE AWARD – USED TO BE BELONGING NEW SERVICE

Bronze Level rewards service in faith and helps participants understand how faith binds people together so that they all belong to the community we call the Church. This award level is accessed by young people no younger than Y7 school age. Young people engaged in this level will begin to see that their faith and action not only makes them belong to a community, but makes them responsible in some small way for the well-being of all others who belong, too.

To achieve this level, participants need to regularly play a substantive role in school or parish events which show that they understand belonging to community involves responsibility for it and also take a role in events away from their home base. Young people who have achieved Pin Level of the award may wish to carry on the same involvements such as reading and serving in their Parish. However, at this level, young people should be more active in their participation. Award Leaders can encourage young people in being more active.

SILVER AWARD – USED TO BE VOCATION NEW LEADERSHIP

Requiring a level of leadership, Silver Level encourages young people to ask themselves "What kind of person do I really want to be?" In answering this question, young people begin to discern their vocation as a gift from God and responding to that gift in faith. As a result of journeying through this award level, participants should realise what they do is a direct consequence of the kind of person they are. It requires more than just 'doing good'. 'Being' good people shaped by the desire to answer God's call is a different endeavour to 'doing' good things. Participants are challenged to respond to that call.

Silver Level recognises and encourages a maturity of faith which is expressed in terms of leadership and initiative.

If entering the award scheme at this level, young people must show evidence of not only playing an active role in activities, but taking the lead. If following on from bronze level, the service may be shown as development / improving understanding.

GOLD AWARD – USED TO BE MISSION NOW INNOVATION

CYMFED GOS GOS ANIAGO

Gold Level not only requires ongoing commitment to active service, but innovation. This award promotes new spiritual and personal growth. It rewards a maturity of faith which leads to innovation and development in terms of outreach and missionary work on behalf the Church community. Participants will clearly see the link between their growth and the well-being of those they hope to serve.

To achieve this level, participants must have first completed Silver Level before progressing to Gold. As with every award level progression, more credits of service are required. However, Gold Level challenges participants to be true missionary disciples. This is evidenced through a committed approach to regular acts of service and involvement and evidence of innovation and development. As a missionary disciple, some acts of service would have to be done independently outside of existing parish structures for the missionary aspect to really mean something. This could be, for example, taking a leadership role on a Lourdes pilgrimage, organising a charity fundraiser. The individual would be expected to take ownership of these events and organise their involvement appropriately. They would be expected to engage in wider issues surrounding the events in which they are participating and so come to a broader understanding of the Church's call for engagement in the corporal works of mercy.

REFLECTION POINT SESSIONS

The format for Reflection Points is based on the good practice through modelling the RCIA model of Catechesis. This includes:

- The Good News Sacred Scripture
- The Church Story Teachings of the Church (Catholic Social Teaching, Apostolic Exhortations etc) and the stories of the lives of the Holy men and women
- Personal Story The personal reflection of the participants based upon their experience

Reflection Point downloads are available from the CYMFed members area.

<u>Personal Note</u> – From a Diocesan view I think that it's important that we meet our young people where they are at. If this means that including the 'catholic social teaching' input, for example, in a reflection may be too much for them, then don't. This is completely up to you as the co ordinator.

FINAL PIECES

Towards the end of their Faith in Action journey, young people submit a final piece of work which evidences their spiritual journey during the award. As the Faith in Action Award is accessible and inclusive, this final piece does not have to be an essay; we encourage young people to be creative as possible. Examples of the final piece of work could be:

Song

Written piece (no more than two sides of A4)

Artwork

Video

Presentation

Poem

Whatever medium the young person chooses to use for their final piece, it should show their experience, learning reflection and faith. Provided that the participant has engaged properly with the scheme and has been well-led through the reflection points, with a well kept journal (?), there should be no question of passing or failing. Final pieces of work are moderated, not marked.

It is in this moderation that their leaders can provide encouragement to the young person.





JOURNALS

It has been advised from CYMFed that each final piece is given in with their journal.

There are two main reasons in which I find this to not be the case for our Archdiocese:

- 1. Although participants should reflect on their own journey through the year, I don't think all young people want to reflect on this by using only one medium (a journal).
- 2. A journal of any kind created by a young person can be a form of privacy. In my own personal view, I wouldn't want someone 'random' looking at all my worries, fears and experiences of faith.
- 3. The number of young people we have completing the award to the number of young people other Dioceses have doesn't compare. Some dioceses only have 30 max signed up, from our point of view and even yours this expectation is unrealistic.

Therefore, journals will not be handed in with your final pieces.



AWARD CEREMONY AND CERTIFICATE/BADGES



CYMFed have asked every awarding authority to have a ceremony each year, this year ours will be on **Wednesday**, 19th **June 2024** with the venue TBC.

- Refreshments 4.30pm
- Award Ceremony 5.00pm
- End of Ceremony 6.30pm Latest Finish

This is one of the main reasons for the award being created back in 2016. The award ceremony allows all young people to come together in one place and celebrate their own dedication and work throughout the year with others who have done the same.

There have been occasions when the numbers attending this ceremony have been lower than we would have liked.

While it is fine to have a ceremony in a school or parish, to not attend the diocesan event removes from the diocesan nature of the award. Having a diocesan event is an opportunity for the diocese, represented by the Archbishop, to thank and reward young people for what they have done. It is also aspirational in the sense that young people can see the numbers involved and aspire to want to do more in the future and see that they are not acting alone.

It is highly recommended that schools / parishes make every effort to attend the awards ceremony.

For this reason, certificate, badges and final moderated pieces will only be available to pick up from Lowe House after Wednesday, 19th June.

We have also had schools not pick up certificate, badges and final moderated pieces from Lowe House. Once again, this is a national award and the young people without their certificate will not be able to prove that they have completed it.



DISCUSSION TIME


